Rabbi Kaplan *Writes...*



Dear Friends,

On January 3rd I was honored to give the benediction at the swearing in of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives. I

took our 14 year old Saraea along to share the experience. Aaron Kaufer's family was sitting in his office, and so was Tara Toohill's (from Hazelton- we know Tara because she is fostering our Breann's younger brother) and their offices are across the hall from each other. But instead of letting Saraea stay with them, watching the proceedings on the TV while enjoying the food and goodies that every House member provided, I made sure she had a ticket to sit on the floor of the House to get the full experience. Unfortunately for her, that experience didn't allow her to charge her cell phone, so she was stuck for the almost two and a half hours.

It lasted longer than usual not because of my benediction, but because of a delay in taking a vote on the first two House bills of the year, which had already been worked out by the leadership, both Republican and Democratic, in the weeks prior. But some members weren't happy with the outcome so they protested and needed to be heard. So Saraea and the rest of us were treated to a display of a very cordial but lengthy repartee between the newly elected Speaker of the House and one of the Gentlemen from Allegheny County, I believe.

Finally the vote was taken and the bills passed and I was invited to lead the benediction. Because the Speaker had introduced his family and spoken about each of his three sons who were present, I threatened to speak about each of my children as well, but when they heard how many children I had there was some nervous laughter. Instead I mentioned that my daughter Saraea was with me and was seated to my right (where another fifty or so people were sitting). I had no idea that such an announcement would be the subject of the talk I would give two

weeks later at the Martin Luther King commemoration at Misericordia.

I gave my benediction, we said goodbye, and made our way to the car and headed toward Wilkes-Barre. On the way I asked Saraea how she felt about my mentioning her presence. She started to laugh. She said that when I mentioned her, "people turned and started to look around. I could see many of the members of Congress looking as well. But no one was looking at me! They were all looking for a white kid!" She thought that was a riot.

If we are to take seriously the relatively new concept in racial education of micro-aggressions, essentially being racist in small almost unperceivable ways, then ignoring Saraea from possibly being the daughter of a white rabbi was a subtle form of racism.

I don't happen to take these micro-aggressions seriously, and I hope Saraea doesn't either. To me it's simply another way to promote victimhood, and I know no happy victims. I'm quite satisfied that Saraea thought the whole thing was funny.

I think Rev. King would have gotten a kick out of that. I think he'd probably hope that someday it would be so commonplace that many or most people in the room would have looked right at Saraea. And some day, maybe they will.

Just after the Holocaust the German Rabbi Leo Beck said that if every German family had just one Jewish relative at their dinner table the Holocaust couldn't have happened. In many ways, that was Rev King's dream as well.

As well intentioned as we may be by looking at micro-aggressions and at systemic racism, it might be simpler if we just made sure we have different kinds of people at our dinner table. People who look different, people who pray differently, people who move around differently, people who vote differently. That last group of different people may be the most difficult to bring to our dinner tables. But it is absolutely crucial. Respecting others' differences of opinion is necessary for

true tolerance to exist.

When I was driving Saraea with some of her friends to roller skating a year ago, one of her friends asked the other, "Do you know Jennie?" And the other girl said "Maybe- what does she look like?" And the other one said "she's darker than me but lighter than you and she has brown hair."

May it be God's will that our children may know all kinds of different people, with all kinds of differences like skin color, and that those colors be used only to describe what their friends look like. Amen.

Cantor's Notes

Tu B'Shevat, the New Year of the Trees, falls on February 11th this year. The holiday originated in the Mishna, which designated Tu B'Shevat as the date when the agricultural cycle began or ended for the purpose of biblical tithes. It was the cut-off date in the Hebrew calendar for calculating the age of a fruit-bearing tree. Historically, the holiday was not of major importance, but it did receive some

attention, the most notable being the institution by the great 16th century kabbalist Rabbi Isaac Luria of a Tu B'Shevat seder, where participants eat 10 different fruits and drink four cups of wine.

Tu B'Shevat gained new meaning and significance thanks to the establishment of the modern State of Israel. The Chalutzim, Zionist pioneers who came to Palestine at the beginning of the 20th century were a tenacious bunch. They had energy and resolve to accompany their vision. They planted cedar trees where none had grown for 2000 years, imported eucalyptus trees from Australia to drain the swamps and worked incredibly hard to do what no one thought could be done – they brought a land that was considered dead and gone back to life.

The recent wave of terror fires in Israel must inspire us to keep the spirit of the chalutzim alive. Israelis have valiantly fought and contained those fires, and will need to replant and restore certain areas that were heavily damaged. Hopefully the heavy rains of winter will cleanse the land, and the onset of Spring (ushered in by Tu B'Shevat) will bring renewed growth to Israel's forests. It is very important this year for all of us to be a part of this renewal by supporting the Jewish National Fund, purchasing trees and contributing to their efforts.

There is a positive result of these terror fires that's worthy of note. Jordan and Egypt sent fire fighters to assist Israel during this tragedy, and Israel gratefully accepted their help. It often goes unnoticed that there are many Arabs and even Arab countries that are, if not friends of Israel, at least pragmatic about working together to better the region. A famous Talmudic tale tells of Rabbi Honi, who comes across an old man planting a carob tree. When he asked why the man was planting a tree that would not yield fruit in his lifetime, the man replied that just as his father and grandfather planted trees that benefited him, so to he was planting this tree for future generations. May future generations of Israelis ultimately be able to live in peace with their neighbors, and continue to lead the way in the improvement of the region and the world.



Our very own, **Lisa Klee**, a Reiki practitioner and thirty year veteran of providing individuals and groups stress-relief and healing through guided meditation and relaxation techniques, will assist in facilitating the service.

About Contemporary Jewish Healing

Organizationally, the contemporary Jewish healing movement encompasses synagogue-based healing services, private healing offered by individual practitioners, community-sponsored ritual and social services for the elderly and chronically ill, and small-group healing rituals carried out in response to the needs of friends or community members.

In most cases, Jewish healing services are often more about providing communal support than about curing the sick, but in the past few decades Jewish medicine, in its true form as an ancient healing tradition, is becoming increasingly recognized.


Scholarship Aid Available for USCJ Summer Programs



