Medical Hospital as they transition into housing from homelessness.

Both Renea and Jane, new members to Temple’s Board, sought to push forward the drive on Veteran’s Day in keeping with the true spirit of this important national holiday. Rabbi Kaplan *Writes...*



Dear Friends,

In the Nov. 29, 2016 *Forward*, a popular Jewish newspaper, author Liza Schoenfein wrote an article titled *Ivanka Trump's Broccoli*

Kugel (for real).

She found it on the Ivanka Trump website along with a picture and the recipe. She noted that the Trump daughter had converted to Judaism and the Kushner family, including her husband Jared and three children, keep Kosher. So the Kushner Kugel by Ivanka saw the light of day.

But a week later, on December 7, 2016 the author wrote another Kugel based article. This one was called *Was I Wrong to Run Ivanka Trump's Kugel Recipe?*

Schoenfein tells us that almost every reaction to the Kugel piece was negative. The letters to the editor, the posts on Facebook and calls to the paper all insisted that she shouldn't have written the article: "I've read it all — from 'The woman is not worthy of our attention' to 'Why in the world would I ever support anything that comes from a 'good Jew' who plays nice with anti-Semites?' to the notion that I'm 'normalizing fascism.' I appreciate and understand the negative sentiments."

She continues: "If I had to sum up the gestalt of my professional life as a food journalist, it is 'food as connector' — the idea that sharing recipes and meals and traditions breaks boundaries of nationality, culture, religion and politics.

"And now I've found the logical end to where food succeeds in doing that. It's with the Trumps. Which compels me to ask: At what point does this family stop dividing us? Judging from #kugelgate, not at the point of kugel."

I don't think it is this family that is dividing us. Had the election gone in the other direction and Chelsea Clinton, also married to a Jewish man, had posted her kugel recipe and it was featured in the *Forward*, I highly doubt

the reaction would have been so clearly negative, despite the pungent animosity there was, even among many Jews, toward her parents.

The kugel is just the most public of the political fallout regarding food. Not as pronounced are the families and friends who have been shunned because of their vote on November 8. Thanksgiving saw many people disinvented to Thanksgiving dinners and the Christmas/Chanukah gatherings also were bereft of holiday cheer due to the outcome of the elections (actually, the proper Kugel would have been an e-Lokshen kugel).

I imagine that probably thousands, if not tens of thousands of people have been "unfriended" from Facebook. Children and parents refuse to speak to each other because of the election. Well, that might not be accurate. I believe that this "unfriending" is mostly a one direction phenomenon. Those who supported Donald Trump are the ones being unfriended and uninvited. Perhaps there are even families in our own circles who have experienced this. I want to point out that when it comes to parents and children, the Ten Commandments is pretty clear- Honoring one's parents is not a two-way street. If a parent voted for Trump and a child refuses to have further contact with that parent because of that vote, I believe the child is committing a sin. Forget the election- unless there has been grave physical abuse by a parent, or the kind of neglect that has brought so many of our foster children to our home through the years, a child is obligated to continue a relationship with the parent.

As for friends and "unfriending" them and other relatives, we have a bit more leeway. But the command "V'Ahavta L'reiacha Kamocho"- Love your neighbor as yourself, still applies. If you wouldn't want a friend to unfriend you because of your political leanings, don't unfriend them for theirs.

Hopefully things will calm down and we'll become more comfortable again with those with whom we disagree, even when we cannot

fathom how they could be so "wrongheaded." Dennis Prager tells of the moral capital we all accrue during our lifetime. Perhaps we need to apply some of that capital- that stored up amount of goodness we've shown- to those who have fallen out of our favor. All the good they have done cannot possibly be washed away because of one ballot cast.

So let's look forward to a Passover recipe from Ivanka. It would be particularly fitting for the Shabbat preceding Pesach, Shabbat HaGadol. The Haftorah says that it is the time of year when "Heishiv Lev Avot Al Banim" Elijah the Prophet will come to turn the hearts of parents toward their children and the hearts of children toward their parents. I hope Passover comes quickly!

Cantor's Notes

This is the time of the year when resolutions are made – going on a diet, saving money, working out. I'd like to add "Coming to Temple" to the list, and hope that will be one resolution that many of you will make and keep. Shabbat services and daily minyan are critical not only to the health of the Temple, but to your spiritual health as well. Making a commitment to

attend even just a few times each month can make an enormous difference in your life.

An old Yiddish proverb states, "Nine rabbis do not constitute a minyan, but ten cobblers can." There are several explanations given for why 10 adults constitute a prayer quorum. Abraham's argument with God that Sodom should be spared for the sake of 10 righteous individuals, the 10 sons of Jacob who went down to Egypt to buy food, and the 10 negative spies are several other Biblical examples. The Rabbis of the Talmud used various interpretive techniques to infer from these stories that sanctification should occur in the midst of a congregation of ten. This is why prayers such as Barchu, Kaddish, and perhaps most importantly the Torah

portion can only be recited in the presence of a minyan.

The concept of minyan reflects Judaism's emphasis on the importance of the Jewish community. Although there are other minyanim in town, it is imperative that Temple Israel's daily services survive as we are the only one that is egalitarian, counting both men and women.

Our minyan is not just a prayer group, I dare say we've become a group of friends. From professional, working women and men to retired individuals and even our youngest members on occasion, our minyan is diverse and welcoming. You don't have to be in mourning to come to minyan; you can come to give thanks, to be spiritually uplifted, to be a part of the community.

Minyan meets on Monday, Thursday and Sunday morning, and every evening at 5:15. On mornings when we don't read the Torah for lack of the required 10, we study the portion. In the afternoon, the service is only about 15 minutes long, but seems to be just the right "spiritual boost" for many. I urge you to check us out!


This year, lunch will be included with hot soup and wraps on the menu, snacks to keep everyone fueled to win, and dessert and coffee to wrap up the afternoon.


Scholarship Aid Available for USCJ Summer Programs

HELP NEEDED

Between the Sulam for Current Leaders and the Visioning Process's Next Steps, the Board of Trustees and the Congregation have been making great strides moving our community forward. We have developed steady momentum and now it's time to turn to you for help. We have programs and visions that need

your participation – in planning, execution and attendance. Following, I have outlined the specific steps that have been developed in the various Bold Statement categories. In each case we will be creating committees to consider and implement our shared vision. It is at this initial stage that you can be most helpful.

Our **Worship** group will be adding the Ritual Committee to its work and will begin considering:

1. Alternatives to enhance our Shabbat services (more participation from the religious school students, and additional opportunities for the Shira group to participate)
2. Review options for our prayer books – including creating a booklet for additional prayers and looking at options for new Shabbat and High Holiday Prayer Books

Our **Financial Management** group will be considering:

1. Creating policies for receivables management and collection
2. Review of The Next Generation program and financial levels as well as prior giving plans used by the Temple, to be certain that the goals of the plans and the needs of the Temple are still in sync
3. Investigate alternative fund raising opportunities that other communities our size use
4. Formally document the broadening focus of various endowments

Our **Congregant Engagement** group is divided into two bodies, *Social Action* and *Chesed*. They will be engaged in reviewing the many events that have been traditionally sponsored as well as investigating additional meaningful programs for our community
