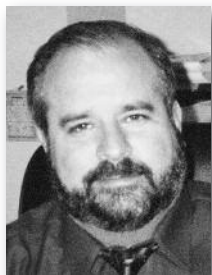

# Rabbi Kaplan *Writes...*



A friend recently died. He was a man who lived his life as a committed Christian who became passionate about his Jewish spiritual roots

when he reached middle age. He felt compelled to share his love of Judaism with others, and specifically his love for Israel. Bruce Fitzgerald was a Zionist's Zionist. He had immense passion for Israel not only because his Christian side knew that Jesus lived and died in the holy land, but because his Jewish side emanated from that same Promised Land.

About seven years ago Bruce, a Brooklynite who spent a number of years in the Stroudsburg area and relocated to Delaware, not too far from Rehoboth Beach, came to the Crossroads Community Church and met with Pastor Rick Betts. He wanted to teach and expose people to his faith driven love for Israel and Judaism.

Over the next six years, Bruce developed a following of hundreds of people and brought into the church countless new members who wanted to learn about their Jewish roots. He taught these folks the foundations of Judaism and its traditions. He held Passover Seders, celebrated other Jewish holidays, and shared insight and his vast knowledge of all aspects of Judaism from the Torah and beyond. He took many trips to Israel, including one with his own students.

Six years ago he began a program at the church- an annual Stand with Israel night. Bruce had become the local representative of CUFI- Christians United for Israel, a 3.5 million plus organization of Christians around the US and beyond who support Israel with their hearts and wallets. Thousands of CUFI members visit Israel each year and support the efforts of AIPAC and other Zionist organizations.

I only had a few opportunities to speak at length with Bruce since I met him two years ago. But those conversations were filled with his love

and respect for Judaism, his sincerity about his Christian faith, and his devotion to Israel. He described in tears the first time he heard the Shofar sounded and the chills that went down his spine. In a fitting tribute, one young man, who had been a student of his, sounded the Shofar that Bruce bought him in Israel last year at the funeral service held for Bruce last week at the church. The service lasted over two hours- every eulogy was beautiful, from his children, from Church members, and even from parents of children in the community Bruce coached in soccer who never knew of his religious fervor.

Ironically, Bruce had invited the former mayor of the Israeli town of Shilo to speak about his new book at the church- the night of Bruce's funeral.

How many Jews do we meet who have this kind of commitment and derive such joy and passion about their Judaism? How many Jews could we hope to muster to visit our own Homeland, Israel? The latest polls show that love for Israel- Zionism is on the decline among American Jews. Jews are more and more critical of Israel, and our own American college campuses are becoming hotbeds of anti-Semitism and the BDS (Boycott, Divest, Sanction) movements against Israel.

Some are wondering, don't I realize that these people have an ulterior motive in their support for Israel? And what is that nefarious motive? That it will bring the coming of the Messiah? That the Jews will all convert to Christianity? That the Jews will all come to Israel where they will be destroyed so that Christianity will take over? Such silliness. Is our Jewish faith so fragile that we can be converted against our will? As for destroying the Jews- the Christians will have to stand in line behind Iran and ISIS and large parts of the Muslim world.

What a wonderful thing it would be if most Jews, even in our very own community, could have just a little of the enthusiasm and love for Judaism and Israel that Bruce Fitzgerald had.

CUFI takes busloads and planeloads of Christians to Israel every year. We're planning a trip to Israel, after a hiatus of three years, next February-March and I'm not sure we'll even have enough people to go as a group, and we really need about 30 to make it happen. It's from Sunday, February 25, 2018 and we return Thursday morning, March 8. The cost will be \$4500 per person. We may not have three and a half million Jews in America who support Israel as Bruce did. But hopefully we have 30 (Jews, Gentiles, etc) who can show support by visiting the home of our ancestors, so that we can say Next Year in Jerusalem.

Tehi Nishmato Baruch, may the memory of Bruce Fitzgerald be for a blessing. Amen

# Cantor's Notes

Time heals all wounds, as the saying goes – but some wounds should never heal. A teacher told me recently that while discussing the Holocaust on Yom Hashoah last month she was shocked when two of the kids (5th graders) asked – “What’s the Holocaust?” This is reason for concern in any case, but all the more so because the students were Jewish. As Winston

Churchill said, “Those who fail to learn from history are condemned to repeat it.” There’s a real danger that Holocaust consciousness will continue to diminish, especially since the last survivors of that horrific era will be gone in the not too distant future. What can we do?

On April 23, Erev Yom Hashoah, the Wyoming Seminary Madrigal Singers, String Ensemble, Orchestra and select members of the Lower School Choir performed "Brundibar," a children's opera that was composed in 1938 by Hans Krasa, with lyrics by Adolf Hoffmeister. Originally composed for a children's opera competition, "Brundibar" premiered in German-occupied Prague. The story depicts the battle of two children against the evil organ-grinder Brundibar, and is a classic tale of good versus evil with justice prevailing in the end. The score was smuggled into the Terezin concentration camp, where it was performed 55 times during World War II. Brundibar was used as a propaganda tool by the Nazis,

being performed for the Red Cross and included in a Nazi film titled The Führer Gives the Jews a City. What the world did not know was that all of the participants in the Theresienstadt production were herded into cattle cars and sent to Auschwitz as soon as filming was finished. Most were gassed immediately upon arrival, including the children, the composer Krása, the director Kurt Geron, and the musicians.

Seminary's Creative Arts Department Chair John Vaida and his team made a special effort to involve students from throughout the school in the production to give as many as possible exposure to this important experience. The performers, staging and musicians were all first rate, but the impact of this event was not the production itself but what it represented. The show ended with a very predictable final number, and as the audience prepared to applaud, the stage suddenly went gray. The performers faced the back of the stage where a giant picture of Theresienstadt was projected. On top of that came the name, picture and fate of various members of the original cast. As each person was named, a Sem performer walked to center stage, placed their hat on the floor and went back to their spot. The silence in the hall was deafening.

I commend John Vaida and Sem for presenting this important and moving production. As long as all of us, Jews and gentiles alike, work together to remember and learn from both the good and evil that has come before us, there's hope that our world can be a better place.

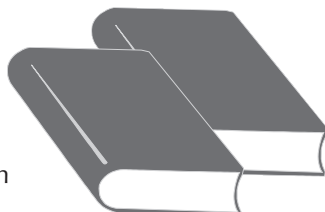

#### Synopsis

In this stunning new historical novel inspired by true events, Kim van Alkemade tells the fascinating story of a woman who must choose between revenge and mercy when she encounters the doctor who subjected her to dangerous medical experiments in a New York City Jewish orphanage years before.

In 1919, Rachel Rabinowitz is a vivacious four-year-old living with her family in a crowded tenement on New York City's Lower Eastside. When tragedy strikes, Rachel is separated from her brother Sam and sent to a Jewish orphanage where Dr. Mildred Solomon is conducting medical research. Subjected to X-ray treatments that leave her disfigured, Rachel suffers years of cruel harassment from the other orphans. But when she turns fifteen, she runs away to Colorado hoping to find the brother she lost and discovers a family she never knew she had.

Though Rachel believes she's shut out her painful childhood memories, years later she is confronted with her dark past when she becomes a nurse at Manhattan's Old Hebrews Home and her patient is none other than the elderly, cancer-stricken Dr. Solomon. Rachel becomes obsessed with making Dr. Solomon acknowledge, and pay for, her wrongdoing. But each passing hour Rachel spends with the old doctor reveal to Rachel the complexities of her own nature. She realizes that a person's fate—to be one who inflicts harm or one who heals—is not always set in stone.

Lush in historical detail, rich in atmosphere and based on true events, Orphan #8 is a powerful, affecting novel of the unexpected choices we are compelled to make.

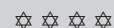

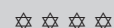

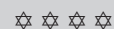
