## Chanukah Care Packages for College Students!



# Rabbi Kaplan Writes...'



Dear Friends,  
I'm looking forward to our trip to Israel at the end of February. While we will be missing Purim in the Wyoming Valley on March 1, we will be celebrating it

twice in Israel. First in the north on that Thursday, and then again in Jerusalem on that Friday, which is called "Shushan Purim". According to the Book of Esther Purim was to be celebrated on the 14th of Adar (March 1) but in walled cities like Shushan was (and Jerusalem is), the celebration happens on the 15th of Adar (March 2). Unlike Halloween, which, while almost universally celebrated in America, is ghoulish and scary, Purim is always festive in Israel. Adults and kids wear all kinds of costumes and have parties and parades and send baskets of food and fun to each other.

To be honest, one day of Purim has always been enough for me, but showing our trip participants how Purim is celebrated in Israel will be special. Almost everyone gets into the spirit of Purim. It's a holiday that the religious and the secular Jews celebrate. It's a reminder of Jewish defiance in the face of tragedy. Queen Esther and Mordecai averted the evil decree of Haman and the Jews of Persia were saved. We just finished celebrating Chanukah which recalls how the Syrian Greeks tried to end our Jewish

traditions and our people miraculously were victorious. And soon we'll celebrate Passover, a reminder of freedom from Egyptian slavery and the miracle of the crossing of the Red Sea where our ancestors barely survived annihilation. From Latkes to Hamantashen to Matzah ball soup, we are reminded of that summary of all Jewish holidays: They tried to kill us, we survived, let's eat!

In the wake of Jerusalem being declared officially (again) as the capital of Israel, and seeing (in mid-December as I'm writing this) "days of rage" going on in Arab countries because of that declaration, one might wonder why the Jews stay in that neighborhood. The Syrians, while not directly targeting Israel as in the Chanukah story, are still wreaking havoc in their country which borders Israel's north. And the Egyptians recently had a mosque bombed and hundreds of worshippers slaughtered in the Sinai. That never happened while Israel occupied that territory. And the Persians, now called Iranians, still insist that Israel must be annihilated. It's almost as if Chanukah, Purim, and Passover are waiting to repeat themselves, and yet Israel remains steadfast.

I've suggested in the past that Israel simply move to Montana. Plenty of space for five or six million Jews. Imagine the scientific, medical, and academic advances that Montana could boast! Imagine how easy it would be to fly there in half the time. And for people like my wife who are still

waiting for a way to drive to Israel, it's actually possible to drive to Montana.

And for the world, which largely hates Israel, and for many college students on our nation's campuses who believe Israel is worse than ISIS or North Korea, the move to Montana would bring instant peace to the Middle East! Imagine no more days of rage, and peaceful coexistence between Sunni and Shi'ite Muslims once the area becomes Judenrein, free of Jews.

Ah, such a dream. The problem is what lies underneath the surface. I don't mean that figuratively- I mean it literally. What lies beneath the surface of much of Israel is ancient Israel. If you want to install a pool in your back yard in Kingston, you have to call the electric and gas company to make sure you won't hit any dangerous pipes or wires while digging. In Israel, you'd have to call the Ministry of Antiquities because chances are good that you'll dig up something 2,000 years old with Hebrew written on it. Israelis- both secular and religious- simply aren't prepared to give up thousands of years of their past just because most people on earth don't believe they have a right to their land.

We'll be digging up some of that history when we visit the archeological excavations at the caves of Beit Guvrin on our trip. We look forward to sharing pictures and experiences when we return. In the meantime, Happy Purim!



# Cantor's Notes ♫♪

The Bible tells of the beautiful trees of Israel and its surrounding regions. Great forests of cedar, along with olive, almond, pomegranate and other fruit trees were found in abundance in many parts of the land. What happened to these ancient forests? Why did the chalutzim who came to restore the Land of Israel find much of it either swamp or barren wasteland? Ancient civilizations used wood for

their great building projects and their armies needed wood for ships and armaments. Babylonian, Greek and Roman conquerors all took their toll on the land. Unfortunately, no one bothered to replant what they cut down, and lack of trees led to erosion and ultimately to the desolate conditions which greeted Israel's early pioneers.

Fortunately, the Zionists who came to Palestine at the beginning of the 20th century were a tenacious bunch. They had energy and resolve to accompany their vision. They planted cedar trees where none had grown for 2000 years; imported eucalyptus trees from Australia to drain the swamps; worked incredibly hard and in many cases gave their lives to do what no one thought could be done – they

brought a land that was considered dead and gone back to life.

I grew up hearing stories and songs of the chalutzim and have vivid memories of buying trees in Hebrew School every year around Tu B'Shvat. It was a big deal to us. It's a practice that seems to have fallen off in recent years, but I think it's high time we revitalize it. Tu B'Shvat is on January 31 this year, I'm going to create "tree planting awareness" amongst our students during the month of January and see if we can get at least one tree planted per family. Our kids (and their parents) know painfully little about the amazing history of Zionism and the foundation of the modern Jewish State, and what they do know is centered around what is reported in the media – mostly fighting and bloodshed between Israel and her neighbors. Let's dwell on all the positives for a change, and the reforestation of our ancient homeland land is certainly a big one.

I ask that you join me in purchasing one or more of these trees this year. This is an opportunity to do what previous generations did to help rebuild Israel, an opportunity to experience the spirit of the chalutzim, and to fulfill the words of the prophet Isaiah: "The desert and the parched land will be glad; the wilderness will rejoice and blossom. Like the crocus, it will burst into bloom; it will rejoice greatly and shout for joy...."


### Synopsis

College student Joe Talbert has the modest goal of completing a writing assignment for an English class. His task is to interview a stranger and write a brief biography of the person. With deadlines looming, Joe heads to a nearby nursing home to find a willing subject. There he meets Carl Iverson, and soon nothing in Joe's life is ever the same.

Carl is a dying Vietnam veteran—and a convicted murderer. With only a few months to live, he has been medically paroled to a nursing home, after spending thirty years in prison for the crimes of rape and murder.

As Joe writes about Carl's life, especially Carl's valor in Vietnam, he cannot reconcile the heroism of the soldier with the despicable acts of the convict. Joe, along with his skeptical female neighbor, throws himself into uncovering the truth, but he is hamstrung in his efforts by having to deal with his dangerously dysfunctional mother, the guilt of leaving his autistic brother vulnerable, and a haunting childhood memory.

Thread by thread, Joe unravels the tapestry of Carl's conviction. But as he and Lila dig deeper into the circumstances of the crime, the stakes grow higher. Will Joe discover the truth before it's too late to escape the fallout?


