### Rabbi Kaplan



Writes.

Dear Friends, I am writing this with thanks to God and to you for all the prayers and blessings and wonderful

visits during and after my brief stay in the hospital recently. The flowers and dinner on our Shabbat table welcoming me home were an added joy. I wanted to take a moment to explain how I came to be on the "other side" of Bikkur Cholim, that great Mitzvah of visiting the sick.

I did not, thank God, have a heart attack. I felt no pain or discomfort, in fact I've been feeling better than I have for years. I did not have a "cardiac event". But I could have. And I have been asking God why I didn't. What have I done to merit escaping that fate?

I've tried all kinds of diets through the years, and have even mentioned a few from the pulpit. But nothing has worked as well, and made me feel as well as the keto (ketogenic) diet I've been on since December. It was through researching this fad diet online, and reading a number of books about it that I learned of a simple CT scan that shows how much calcification is in your arteries. Despite my cholesterol numbers being good, and having absolutely no symptoms of heart problems (but with a genetic disposition for them), I took the test which showed a great deal of calcification. The next step was a stress test. I had taken one a few years ago and I didn't like the experience.

I wasn't in good physical shape, so the stress for the test was injected into me. I cannot think of a better way of making lots of money than selling my stress to a pharmaceutical company to use in stress tests. Where do I sign up? But this time, having been on keto for over half a year, I was feeling great, and opted for the treadmill stress test. And I was amazed

to actually finish it. The problem was I didn't pass it. And that led to a cardiac catheterization which revealed three blockages and required four stents, which is why I was in the hospital.

I'm happy to share with anyone who is interested what I have learned about keto, metabolism, diet, exercise, etc. I'm following this all religiously, but I haven't found many converts, especially in my own family! So, I'll follow Rabbi Hillel's advice from a few thousand years ago, IM EIN ANI LI MI LI- If I am not for myself, who will be for me, and unless I'm asked about it, I'll keep it to myself!

But it is a diet that is quickly catching on, and it costs nothing more than not being on a diet, and it doesn't require any monthly payments or supplements.



The only problem is that it goes against everything we've all been taught about eating and what actually is a heart healthy diet. Instead of low fat, it's high fat. Instead of healthy grains it's no grains. Instead of good carbs, it's good fats. And it's definitely no sugar. But I will tell you, it's been magical for me. No cravings for food, no hunger pangs, no addiction to any of the things I used to eat-like pizza, pasta, bread, rice, etc. I still have plenty of weight to lose- I need to become half the man I used to be. But it's been a great ride so far. And it even saved me from a

potentially severe cardiac event.

And it brought me to two very important eye-opening issues. First, why did I get off so easy? I've visited so many people through the years who have suffered- really suffered with heart problems. I've tried to bring comfort to so many families who have lost loved ones to cardiac events. Why was I not only given a pass, with major blockages that weren't revealed by my clinical numbers, but when it came to repairing the damage, it barely affected me? The biggest issue during that hospital stay was that the nurses kept waking me up as soon as I dozed off because my heart rate was going low and it set off an alarm at the nurse's station! I even found the bed comfortable!

I know from the Torah that in spite of amazing miracles happening for the Jewish people, our reaction to them has been to complain. Immediately after crossing the Red Sea, and seeing our pursuers drown in the water behind us, the very first thing the Israelites did was to complain to Moses that there was no water to drink. And the complaints have continued to this day. We seem to ignore the miracles and focus only on what's going wrong.

I can't ignore this miracle. Every time someone emailed or texted or called or visited me with wishes and prayers for a speedy recovery I felt that these blessings were misplaced. I was feeling great- the day before the procedure and the day after. Surely these kind, beautiful, heartfelt thoughts should be sent to someone more worthy of them. Now, of course, I milked the situation at home, saying I wasn't supposed to lift anything (like the trash bags, for example) and am hoping to get a letter from my cardiologist attesting to that for a year at least! But in general, I truly feel that I was saved and I simply don't get why. The other issue is knowing what it's like to be in a hospital bed. The vulnerability of lying under a blanket in a flimsy smock that has no material in the back, as friends and colleagues and congregants

come into the room to offer kind words. It's one thing seeing people outside of the Temple when I'm not wearing a tie. It's completely different when I'm not wearing anything! And I realized how often I visited people in the hospital without once stopping to think about their vulnerability in that situation. I know that anyone who does Bikkur Cholim, visiting the sick, brings some comfort and a friendly smile to someone in need. It's considered one of the greatest Mitzvot in Jewish tradition.

But I now have a new perspective on it. Am I invading privacy? Should I knock or just walk in? Is this a good time to visit? Are my questions invasive? Is this a bad time? Is this person thinking, "When is he going to leave so I can get more comfortable?" So, I want to take this opportunity as the days of repentance get nearer, to apologize to any of you, or your loved ones or friends, that I have made uncomfortable during a visit. And at the same time, I want to reiterate my thanks and appreciation for all the prayers and blessings I have received.

As we prepare for the High Holy Days, days of repentance and days of hope, staring at that Book of Life ahead of us, let us resolve to enhance and be thankful for not only our own lives, but the lives of everyone we touch. Amen.

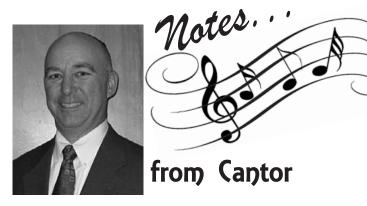
I ask each and every member, regardless of your current dues or membership status, to commit to one of the TNG 2 levels of participation in the coming year.

Our great sages were practical as well as pious. Aware of human nature and tolerances, they developed our practices and rituals in ways that people would be able to and want to observe. Realizing that we cannot jump right into the High Holidays without preparation, they designated the month of Elul as a time for spiritual introspection, a time to begin the process of granting and asking for forgiveness.

There are a number of special rituals added to our minyan services during Elul. These include the blowing of the shofar at the conclusion of the morning service (except on Shabbat), the recitation of Psalm 27 (morning and evening) followed by an extra Mourner's Kaddish, and special penitential prayers called Slichot (varies according to Ashkenazic and Sephardic tradition). It is also a time to "brush up" on your prayer skills, not only reading and singing the text, but comprehending it's meaning as well. Attending weekday and Shabbat services is a great way to get ready for the Yamim Noraim (Days of Awe). An athlete would not run a race or even work out without warming up. It's really the same with prayer.

This year the first of Elul happens to land on September 1. You have a month to prepare yourselves spiritually for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. I guarantee your experience on the holidays well be enhanced by even a little bit of preparation. To make this easier for you I've posted (as a special feature for the High Holiday season) selections from the Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur liturgy on our website (templewb.org) - selections designed to help you learn some of the melodies for the holiday season. If you'd like additional help, I'm available to get together with you, one on one, to improve your prayer skills.

Make this the year you become more comfortable with Jewish liturgy. It will strengthen your Jewish identity and nourish your

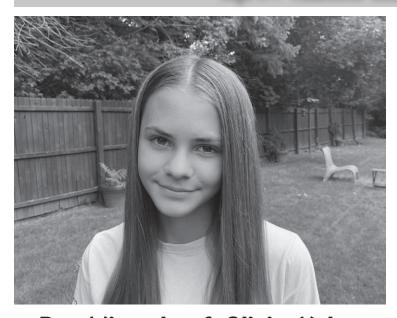

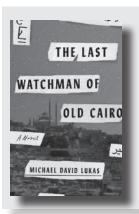
