Writes...

Dear Friends,

I am writing on the eve of the New Year. The Torah reading a few days ago began, HaChodesh Hazeh Lachem Rosh Chodashim- This month shall be for you the Beginning of Months- which is a New Year. And it begins in Nisan because Passover comes two weeks later. It was essentially the beginning of the Jewish People. So, L'Shanah Tovah! I'll offer that greeting again in seven months, just before Tishrei, which is a different New Year based not on the months, but on the years. For some reason, about which I'm not quite sure, it garners much more attention than this New Year in Nisan.

Coming back to our beginnings as a People this month at Passover makes me think of our beginnings as people, the Days of Creation. How old is the Universe? Scientists say the earth is 14 billion years old, but don't traditional Jews say it is 5,783 years old? Many gathered at the JCC recently to listen to a talk by Dr. Gerald Schroeder, a Jewish scientist trained at MIT and now living in Israel. He presented a wonderful explanation of when the earth came into existence from a scientific approach. And yet he is an observant Jew who fully accepts the Torah's account of creation. As the joke goes, "But Rabbi, how can they both be right?"

We read the Torah from the beginning. God spent 6 days creating the universe. And in those six days things were created that made progressive sense, from light to vegetation to animals to humans. And if we begin with the creation of Adam and Eve, when He breathed into them a Neshama, a soul, and count forward 5783 years, we get to us.

In order to find out how long those first six days took, we can't start from the beginning and look forward, we need to start from today and look backward. And when scientists from NASA look backward to creation, they see that the further they go back, the more time is stretched out. Through amazing calculations they determined that those original few "days of creation" lasted 14 billion years. The infinitesimal amount of time since Adam and Eve were created, just a speck in time, looks like normal time. But the years before were incredibly long.

I'm not doing him justice, but it changed my understanding of Genesis and the similarity between faith in the Torah and the science.

Another talk some of us heard a week ago was at King's College. And it changed my thinking on my lifelong beliefs about the Israeli-Arab situation. I always believed that the Palestinian and Israeli clash was due to animosity and hatred that was always present and had no chance of change. But listening to an Orthodox rabbi who is a settler in the West Bank changed my mind. Rabbi Hanan Schlesinger told us that after realizing that he had lived behind the barbed wire of his town near Palestinian villages south of Jerusalem in "occupied territory" for many years, he realized that he had never gotten to know any actual Palestinians from those villages. They were neighbors who never spoke. Their children didn't know each other, and they never even had a cup of coffee together. But when he and others started an organization called "Roots", both sides realized that they each had a story, a narrative about how they belonged in that land. And that unless both sides could accept that they both actually belonged there, there could never be peace because the only relationship they could have would be one of animosity and fear.

So since 2014 this group has been expanding the number of Jews and Arabs and Christians and anyone else interested in grassroots efforts to get to know the "other." And while the progress is slow, it is moving in the right direction.

The Palestinian who spoke, Khalid, grew up in Gaza, and moved to Ramallah when he was a teenager. While he was hopeful that peace could eventually be achieved, he clearly was not exuding love for Israel or its authority over the territories. While he doesn't believe that militant extremist groups like Hamas are helping the Palestinians, he seemed to lay the fault for most of his troubles on Israel, without even once suggesting that Israel through its first seventy five years had done anything positive for the world.

And still, I left hopeful. Ann Smith suggested a book to me about a 100-year Harvard study on happiness. The conclusion based on the evidence the researchers have gathered through all these years is that true happiness is based on good relationships. Folks in the Middle East won't be able to find true happiness until they can foster good relationships. And growing up and living an entire lifetime in Israel without ever developing any relationships with the Palestinians who live five minutes away can't lead to much happiness. So, if the Jewish and Arab adults can't bring themselves to do so, perhaps they can let the little kids meet each other and make friends. I'm hopeful that it won't take another seventy five years for that to happen.

Cantor's Notes



“Hachodesh hazeh lachem rosh chodashim...”

God calls the month of Nisan (the month which includes Passover) the first month of the year for the Jewish People. Now most of you are saying, “Wait, I thought Rosh Hashanah was the start of the Jewish year. Well, Rosh Hashanah actually occurs on the 15th day of the 7th month. I know, complicated and confusing, but that’s just because of the name. When you think about it historically, the story of Passover is the origin story of the Jewish People. Under the leadership of Moses, the Israelites quickly evolved from a large, mostly related but very disorganized group of former slaves into a nation with a societal structure and a new religion. The Exodus was the first event in the 40-year process of transformation from an enslaved band of tribes to an organized nation under God’s law. No wonder God designated this month as our starting point!

Passover and the story of the Exodus are seared into our collective memory. It embodies so many concepts that are essential to Judaism – the value of liberty and freedom, the importance of God’s law and salvation, the ideals of social action which became part of being Jewish because we knew what it was like to be downtrodden and oppressed. This is why, even if we all were experts on every aspect of Jewish history and law, it would still be incumbent upon us to re-tell the story. We need to feel that we personally experienced the miracle of the Exodus, and we need to transmit that feeling to our children from generation to generation. Passover is not just ancient history – the stories, songs, rituals and even the food of the Seder help us both physically and mentally experience the holiday.

Certainly, there is a “labor-intensive” aspect to Passover that overwhelms many of us, and a week of Passover food does take its toll. But, like everything in life, a positive approach to the holiday will pay back exponentially. Doing research, bringing in some new appropriate readings, learning a new song, decorating your table in a creative way to help tell the story enhances your seder. Reading the Biblical account of the Exodus, exploring modern commentaries and theories make the story more interesting. Even

watching the many movies about the Passover story will help the holiday mood.

We have musical samples of the Hagaddah and several Passover songs for you to enjoy on our website.

Aish.com is another great site to help spark your interest and get you engaged. Use these suggestions to get started, but exploring on your own is highly encouraged. You’ll be fulfilling the verse from the beginning of the Haggadah: **“Even if we were all wise, all people of understanding, all well-versed in Torah, we would still be commanded to tell the story of the Exodus from Egypt.”**

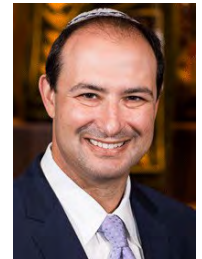
Podcast Features Rabbi Jeremy Barras

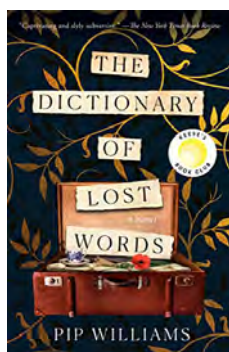

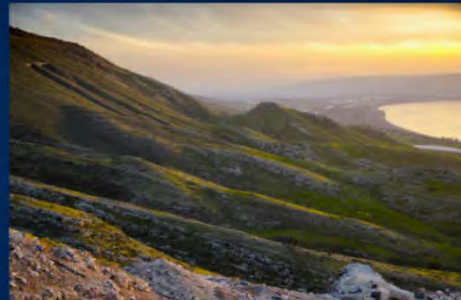
